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

Life-world interview (process, low degree of standard, new ideas and thoughts)


Field notes (before, during and after)



- Typed word-for-word included all kind of noises or interruptions
- Ex ..(R) No one can understand how I feel ... Now comes my husband (whispering). (R) says «Hi» and the husband answers «Hi». (the husband walks past and into another room)
- Ex.. But sometimes... (other interpreter interrupts and says) Many people look at you and you can feel that they become very (paus) ...they feel sorry for me. (Interpreter change).






